Emily's Story By: Emily Langer

As the end of my service year approaches, I find myself reflecting on my path and where I am headed. I am a second year AmeriCorps and two years ago, I would not have guessed that I would be where I am today. These past two years have been filled with uncertainty for most people. It was a big decision to pack up my city life (in the height of the pandemic) and leave behind friends and family to follow a calling that I think a lot of us who enter this field are familiar with.

It is a fortunate thing to find your vocation so early in life even if the path to get there is filled with obstacles. I've been drawn to the outdoors since a young age and although I have explored different career paths my heart has always brought me back to conservation. As Aldo Leopold said, "There are some of us who can live without wild things, and some who cannot".



Extending my time in AmeriCorps has allowed me to get so much more out of my experience while making a greater impact in this field. We wasted no time continuing our study on the federally threatened cheat mountain salamander and completing what was our sixth and seventh rounds of occupancy surveys. This additional time also allowed us to see the project enter its next phase.

Completing projects from previous years also allowed us to see the start of new ones, including a study on saw-whet owls. Little is known about their migration patterns and surveys will allow researchers to determine if the owls are utilizing the area during their migration periods. This second year has also given me the opportunity to work with agency partners like the Forest Service to further my career training and development in areas like river snorkeling and chainsaw training.

Collaboration with other sites as well as other members has been an exciting opportunity and has only added to the value of my AmeriCorps experience. I will carry these experiences with me through the rest of my career and although it saddens me to say goodbye to this beautiful area and its people, I would not be surprised if West Virginia called me back home for a third time.

The AFNHA Annual Meeting will be held Tuesday June 28 at Adaland Mansion outside of Philippi, Barbour County. This will include a public meeting to review the Management Plan, stakeholder conversations on moving forward,

and annual elections for AFHA, Inc.

Almost two years from the official launch of AFNHA Management Planning in June 2020, the plan is drafted and review is underway. Once the plan draft is completed and formatted, it will be



posted on our website and made available to the public for a formal 30 day public review, likely starting in late June. In addition to the in-person public meeting June 28, we will also hold a virtual public meeting June 29 to discuss the plan and invite comments.
